

Ross, Lainie Friedman

Lainie Friedman Ross, M.D., Ph.D., is the Carolyn and Matthew Bucksbaum Professor of Clinical Medical Ethics; Professor, Departments of Pediatrics, Medicine, Surgery and the College; Co-Director of the University of Chicago Institute for Translational Medicine, and Associate Director of the MacLean Center for Clinical Medical Ethics. Dr. Ross earned her AB from the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University (1982); an MD from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine (1986) and a PhD in Philosophy from Yale University (1996). She trained at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and at Babies Hospital of Columbia University now the Morgan Stanley Children's Hospital of New York-Presbyterian.

Dr Ross is a primary care pediatrician at The University of Chicago Comer Children's Hospital. Her research portfolio focuses on ethical and policy issues in pediatrics, organ transplantation, genetics, and human subjects protections. She has published four books and over 200 articles in the peer-reviewed literature. She is currently writing a book on living donor transplantation with J. Richard Thistlethwaite, MD, PhD that was funded, in part, by a Robert Wood Johnson Investigator Award in Health Policy.

Dr. Ross has served on the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Bioethics (1999-2005) and the American Academy of Pediatrics Section on Bioethics Executive Committee (1999-2014) in which she served as chair from 2010-2014. She has also served on the Ethics Committee of the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) (2005-2011), the Secretary Advisory Committee for Human Research Protections (SACHRP) (2010-2014), and the National Institutes of Health Recombinant DNA Advisory Committee (2014-2018). Dr Ross was a 2014 recipient of a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellowship and the 2015 recipient of the William Bartholome Award in Ethical Excellence from the American Academy of Pediatrics.
