Urgent Opportunity for Pediatric Subspecialty Advocacy

We have a unique and time-sensitive advocacy opportunity for you to advocate for increased funding for the Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program (PSLRP), which is essential to addressing shortages of pediatric medical subspecialists, pediatric surgical specialists, and child mental health professionals. We need you to take action as soon as possible.

Our advocacy efforts have been paying off. Congress funded PSLRP for the first-time in Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, providing \$5 million for the program in the spending bill signed by President Biden in March. The federal government is now using this funding to stand up the program. The new program will provide loan repayment for pediatric medical subspecialists, pediatric surgical specialists, and child mental health professionals who care for children in underserved areas, addressing critical shortages of these highly trained professionals by lessening financial disincentives for pursuing pediatric specialty training.

That's where we need your help. This initial investment in PSLRP is a crucial step forward, but more funding is needed in FY 2023 to expand the program's reach. You can take action to educate your member of Congress about the importance of this program and advocate that they increase its funding.

Two members of the House – Rep. Kim Schrier (D-Wash.) and Rep. John Joyce (R-Pa.), a pediatrician and dermatologist, respectively – are circulating a **bipartisan letter** and asking all their colleagues in the House to join them in signing it. This letter will be sent to appropriators, the members of Congress who write the spending bills. The letter asks for \$30 million in funding for the Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program. Our goal is to get as many U.S. representatives to sign this letter as possible to show House appropriators the breadth of support for the program.

But the deadline for your representative to sign this letter is April 22 – so we need you to take action now! **Please email or call your U.S. representative as soon as possible and ask them to sign the Schrier/Joyce letter of support for \$30 million in funding for the Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program.** A template email and phone script specifically for contacting your U.S. representative is available below.

We expect a similar funding request letter will be circulating in the Senate later this spring. We will be back in touch at that point to ask for you to reach out to your senators as well.

Contact Your Representative Today

Reach out to your U.S. representative today and urge them to sign the Schrier/Joyce letter of support for \$30 million in funding for the Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program. You can reach out to them by phone or email. If you have time, you can call and then follow-up via email to maximize your impact. You can also call your House member's office again later this week to remind them join the letter if they haven't already.

Subject: Strengthen Child Health and Mental Health in Rural and Underserved Areas

As a constituent I am urging you to sign Representative Schrier and Representative Joyce's letter supporting \$30 million in funding for the Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program in Fiscal Year 2023. This program will help provide children with timely access to health services.

Millions of children reside 1.5 hours or more from needed specialty care. Across the country, there are significant shortages of pediatric subspecialists and child and adolescent psychiatrists, which lead to long travel distances and long appointment wait times.

There is also a disparity in the geographic distribution of pediatric subspecialists, resulting in many children in underserved rural and urban areas not receiving timely health care. Children with complex medical conditions are among the most vulnerable; their ability to see the right doctor in a reasonable amount of time should not be determined by where they live.

Many pediatric researchers are trained as subspecialists and dedicate their careers to research on complex health needs like Type 1 diabetes and autism spectrum disorder. Shortages of pediatric subspecialists may also slow the development of the next generation of treatments and cures for young people.

The Pediatric Subspecialty Loan Repayment Program will soon be helping to increase access to pediatric subspecialists who provide care in underserved and rural areas. Congress provided crucial first-time funding for this program in Fiscal Year 2022, and an increased investment will help expand the reach of this program. Once implemented, this program will provide \$35,000 in loan repayment per year for up to three years in exchange for providing care for an underserved area, helping to address the economic factors that discourage individuals from subspecializing.

As a pediatrician practicing in an academic medical center, my debt burden remains significantly high even after years of practice. I know that there will be significant interest among my colleagues in taking advantage of this important program.
