What is SPR?



HISTORY

 1929: SPR originated because of discontentment among young investigators - referred to as "Young Turks" - who felt the existing pediatric societies were dominated by very senior faculty

MISSION

To create a multi-disciplinary network of diverse researchers to improve child health

MEMBERSHIP (Active)

- Honorary society
- Membership is by current Member nomination and Council review
- Eligible Members have a record of current, independent research related to child health

SPR Junior Section



- Established in 2012
- Residency &/or Fellowship through first 6 years as faculty
- Free no cost for junior membership
- "Rolling Admissions" by self-nomination
- Leadership: Fellows
- Junior members receive SPR communications, are invited to SPR events and may serve on SPR committees as approved by Council

SPR Active Member

- Individual engaged in ongoing, independent, hypothesis-driven research related to pediatrics
- Track record of independent work initiated since fellowship (original science manuscripts)
- Typically hold a faculty appointment at the mid/late assistant or early associate level or higher
- Annual dues \$350 (includes online subscription to Pediatric Research)
- No age restrictions!



Lila Nolan is a fellow in the Neonatal-Perinatal Medicine program at the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis. Her research interests involve the study of the cellular and molecular mechanisms involved in the pathogenesis of necrotizing enterocolitis (NEC). She joined laboratory of Dr. Misty Good upon starting her fellowship and currently studies the mechanisms by which dietary aryl hydrocarbon receptor (AhR) ligands mediate protection against intestinal inflammation using a murine model of NEC. This investigation introduces a novel therapeutic for infants with NEC and will advance the current understanding of NEC pathogenesis.

As an officer of the SPR Junior Section, she aims to provide junior members with education and support to foster successful careers as physician-scientists.




President-elect

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

Junior Member nomination is open to individuals who are currently enrolled in or not more than six years graduated from an established residency, fellowship or postdoctoral program related to pediatrics in an academic institution.

The information below will be requested when submitting an application/nomination:

- Applicant's personal and professional contact information.
- Applicant's residency, fellowship, or postdoctoral completion date or anticipated completion date.
- Applicant's Program Director (Residents/Fellows) or Department Chair's (Junior Faculty) contact information.

Eligibility:

Currently enrolled in or not more than six years graduated from an established residency, fellowship, or postdoctoral program related to pediatrics in an academic institution.

Any incomplete applications will be deleted after six months from the initial application date.

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
